
Attached to the Amicus Curia Brief recently filed by me on behalf of several correctional associations was an Appendix "E" which was the 1985 Annual Report of the Division of Corrections to the governor and to the citizens of the state. The paragraph in the Brief referring to the report was inadvertently deleted.

The purpose for enclosing the report as an exhibit was for the Court to have access to and be familiar with the most recent data and demographic information on the inmate population contained in the report which begins on page 67.

This gives a snapshot of the inmate population and particular consideration should be given to the data illustrating the inmate profile which certainly from a public standpoint represents a high risk population. I would particularly like to call the Court's attention to the Education Chart, the Number of Prior Convictions Chart, the Number of Times Incarcerated, and the Number of Prior Arrests. These charts well illustrate the tremendous difficulty corrections officials face in dealing with this segment of society.

If this letter could be attached to the briefs, I think no further formal errata would be needed.
